#### **LATE DEVELOPMENTS**

At the beginning of May, we heard from Aya Schwartz that she was going to have to miss the SIA trip due to an injury requiring surgery. The following week, Alice Cai dropped out, citing schedule conflicts.

So, after selecting two students, we ended up sending *zero* students to SIA. Needless to say, this was a huge disappointment. Our SIA Liaison, Tracy Fulop, quickly notified the State League both times, as there was a waiting list of students from other local leagues around the state. LWVNY was able to

host fifty-nine students at the conference which, by all accounts, went very well.

We had a brief discussion at the Annual Meeting and agreed that perhaps offering the SIA program to high school juniors would help prevent a last-minute cancellation from happening again. A junior could include SIA in their college application materials, providing extra incentive to attend.

#### **LWVNYS COUNCIL**

In the years when LWVUS holds its convention, LWVNYS holds Council. This year's State Council is on June 11; next year, LWVNYS will hold a convention in Albany.

We are allotted two voting delegates at the state level. President Susan Ferris Rights will attend Council virtually on June 11 and cast our two ballots.

#### **LWVW CONVENTION**

This year's League of Women Voters of Westchester (LWVW) Convention will be held in person on June 6. LWVNEW members Nancy Miringoff and Kimberly Morella will join Susan Ferris Rights as attendees.

#### **NEW YORK'S ERA**

As of this writing, the New York State Equal Rights Amendment will not appear on the ballot in November. A judge has ruled that the State Senate made a procedural error in approving the amendment and this ruling removes the ERA from statewide ballots.

The League of Women Voters of New York fully expects this situation to change and is confident that, upon appeal, the NY-ERA will be restored to the ballot.

#### **LEVELS OF LEAGUE**

A reminder that, while the League never supports or opposes candidates, it *does* hold positions on issues. LWVUS & LWVNYS provide advocacy opportunities for League members to get further involved if they so choose.
