LWVNYS took the opportunity to use the February 14th anniversary of the founding of the League of Women Voters as a "Day of Action." LWVNYS encouraged members to contact their elected state representatives to push for the adequate funding of Early Voting. Since members of local Leagues are also members of the New York State League, LWVNEW sent an email to its members, asking them to contact their reps. EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT

On January 27, Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment. The League of Women Voters has supported and pushed for ratification of the ERA since it was first passed by Congress in 1972. Leagues across the country have worked to engage lawmakers and organize at the grassroots level to ensure equal rights for all, regardless of sex, is enshrined in the Constitution. 100TH ANNIVERSARY!

The League was officially founded in Chicago in 1920, just six months before the 19th amendment was ratified and women won the vote. Formed by the suffragists of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, the League began as a "mighty political experiment" designed to help 20 million women carry out their new responsibilities as voters.


